We would like to affirm our commitment to the welfare of the whole of the human family.
And we would seek to make ourselves available, to brothers and sisters who are marginalized, in their ongoing struggle for love and justice.

We disagree about many things, but one thing we agree on: the need for us to join together, to develop a community in our locality, that is more devoted, more inclusive, and more nonviolent.
